The policy intent of the Code of Conduct for Aged Care (the Code)



Policy Intent of the Code

- Applies to approved providers, as well as, current and previous aged care workers and governing persons.
- Protects older Australians and ensures there are consequences for poor conduct.
- Banning orders can apply in the most serious cases.

The Code, what it means for providers, governing persons and workers, and how to get prepared



The new Code of Conduct for Aged care

- o will be introduced from 1 December 2022
- aims to improve safety and wellbeing for consumers and boost trust in services.



The Code sets out standards of expected behaviours and applies equally to:

- Approved aged care providers
- Governing persons (e.g. CEOs and board members)
- Aged care workers
 - People who are employed by the approved provider, including volunteers
 - People employed by a contractor or subcontractor to the provider, including volunteers.



Code of Conduct for Aged Care

When providing care, supports and services to people, I must:

- a) act with respect for people's rights to freedom of expression, self-determination and decision making in accordance with applicable laws and conventions
- b) act in a way that treats people with dignity and respect, and values their diversity
- c) act with respect for the privacy of people
- d) provide care, supports and services in a safe and competent manner, with care and skill



- e) act with integrity, honesty and transparency
- f) promptly take steps to raise and act on concerns about matters that may impact the quality and safety of care, supports and services
- g) provide care, supports and services free from:
 - all forms of violence, discrimination, exploitation, neglect and abuse; and
 - sexual misconduct
- h) take all reasonable steps to prevent and respond to:
 - all forms of violence, discrimination, exploitation, neglect and abuse
 - sexual misconduct.

Legislation, the Commission's role and how we regulate the Code



The Legislation

- Royal Commission Response Act 2022 was passed by parliament in August this year.
- The Act
 - allows for the creation of a Code of Conduct for Aged Care
 - sets out the Commission's role including powers to monitor and enforce compliance with the Code.



How we will regulate the Code

- When we become aware of information that raises concerns about conduct that is inconsistent with the Code, we can:
 - Contact providers, workers, governing persons, consumers or complainant to discuss the issue; this may be as part of a complaint process or in response to a reportable incident notification
 - Require a provider or other person to provide us with information
 - Require the provider to take a specific action
 - Provide education to providers or an individual
 - Undertake an investigation which might be followed by compliance action and enforcement action.
